Our exam results are of a consistently high standard and each year around 80% of Year 13 students go onto Higher Education, some going to Oxford or Cambridge or highly sought after courses such as medicine or veterinary science.

Students in the Sixth Form have access to a dedicated Common Room, PC room and private study areas allowing them to effectively use study time to complete their work. Many faculty areas also have dedicated sixth form facilities.

There are a wide range of extracurricular and enrichment activities available, including sports teams and regular fund-raising events such as talent shows. Many subject areas run educational visits to support their students' learning and understanding of the course content.

The 2025 picture



- Application cycles continue to be tough, sometimes with fewer offers and later decisions
- Law, Psychology, Computer Science and Sports Science are the top 4 subjects by application with a 64% - 84% offer rate. Medicine is in 6th but with only a 27% offer rate
- Clearing in 2025 was competitive.- nearly 50% of 18 year olds used DMP to accept an offer in Clearing

The 2025 picture



- Continues to be challenging for students
- Increased numbers applying - entry grades being adjusted
- There were 759,830 applications for full-time undergraduate places through UCAS in 2025, up approx 7000 on 2024
- The number of accepted applicants increased by 2.3% in 2025. The number of home 18 year olds accepted was up by 3.5% to a record total of 289,200

The 2025 picture



- More students are electing to stay at home while they study - a 6.5% increase on 2024
- Higher tariff providers have seen 7.4% increase in acceptances in 2025 to 187,900 the highest on record.
- Students will be reapplying with grades achieved or applying through clearing
- Offers continue to be made **holistically** - not just based on grades

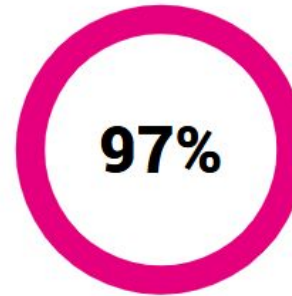

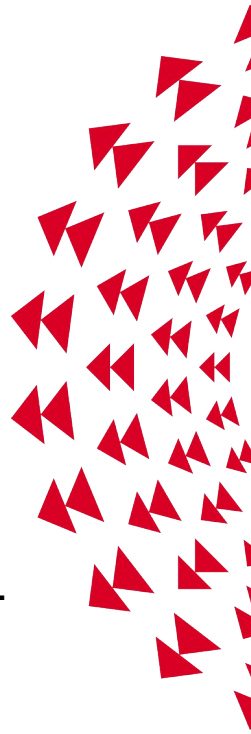
Choosing the right course...

- What does the course cover?
- Courses with the same title may be very different.
- Look carefully at the core course content, and the range of optional studies/modules available.
- Which modules are the most interesting and relevant to your career aspirations?
- See if the course or university/college offers any internship, placement, or study abroad opportunities.
- How is the course taught – structured teaching, or more independent research? How many lectures are there, and how much group work will be done in seminars?
- How is the course assessed?

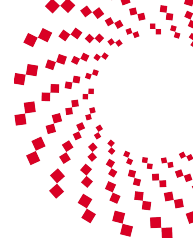


Location... location... location...

- **Style** – from traditional, with a focus on subject-based courses and research, to modern universities/colleges, with a greater focus on vocational courses.
- **Location** – some are in large cities, others in small towns, by the coast or in the countryside – it's all a major influence on the environment and lifestyle.
- **Size** – larger universities can have more than 20,000 students, whereas some of the smallest have only a few thousand.
- **Culture and facilities** – influenced by a range of factors, including the diversity of students who attend.
- **What graduates do** – all universities collect destination statistics; it can be useful to find out what jobs or further study students go on to.
- **Tuition fees** – can vary between universities and colleges; check if there are scholarships or bursaries available.
- **Living costs** – accommodation, transport, and food can vary enormously.



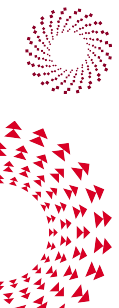
The New Personal Statement Format...



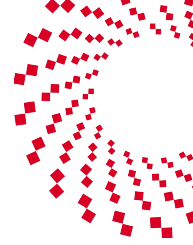
UCAS is replacing the traditional free form statement with three structured questions

The Three Questions

1. Why do you want to study this course or subject?
2. How have your qualifications and studies helped you prepare for this course or subject?
3. What else have you done to prepare outside of education, and why are these experiences useful?



1. Why do you want to study this course or subject?



Purpose:

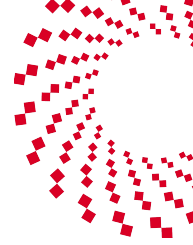
To showcase your passion, interest or understanding of the course / subject you are applying for.

Consider:

- Discuss your motivations and any pivotal moments that have inspired / shaped your choice
- Highlight specific areas of interest or topics you have explored.
- Mention any super-curricular activities, such as extra reading, research or relevant projects.



2. How have your qualifications and studies prepared you for this course or subject?

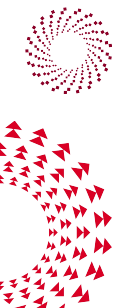


Purpose:

Demonstrate how your academic background has prepared you for this course.

Consider:

- Identify relevant subjects & explain their significance to your chosen course
- Discuss specific skills you have developed, e.g. research, analysis or problem solving
- Reflect on particular projects, assignments or activities that are pertinent to the course/subject.



3. What else have you done to prepare outside of education and why are these experiences useful?

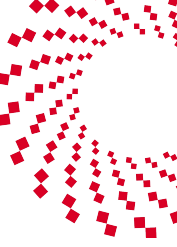
Purpose:

Highlight extra curricular activities that have prepared you for university study.

Consider:

- •Include work experience, volunteering or hobbies related to your course
- •Explain the skills or insights gained from these experiences
- •Link these experiences and explain how they will benefit your future studies.

Decisions...



Universities & colleges will review:

- ★ Personal Statement
- ★ Qualifications / predicted grades
- ★ Reference

They may also ask for:

- ★ Admission Test
- ★ Interview
- ★ Audition / Showreel / Portfolio



Offers...

Conditional: Dependent on results

Unconditional: No strings attached!

Once students have had responses from ALL of the institutions they have applied to the need to choose:

- **Firm:** first choice
- **Insurance:** second choice

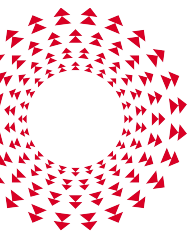
Inform UCAS which two offers you want to accept via Track

Keep to reply deadlines or choices can be 'declined by default'



Advice from a university...

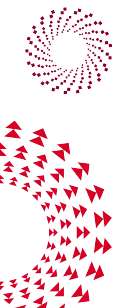
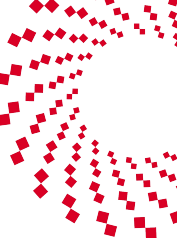
- The application is a two way process – chance for to get to know applicant & vice versa
- Universities are not looking for ready made Doctors / Nurses / Midwives / Teachers etc. – looking for potential, transferable skills, personal qualities & desire to succeed.
- If you are not sure about something – ask questions!
- Universities are supportive & open places of education – there to help & encourage.
- There is no such thing as a silly question



Student Next Steps...

- Research ALL career options / interests
- Think about interests, skills and what they enjoy.
- Seek advice...speak to Careers Advisors, Tutors, Family
- Consider how they can stand out...
 - Extra / Super Curricular activities
 - Work Experience / Volunteering
 - Responsibilities & other activities
- Focus on this year's studies
- Continue to develop study & research skills.
- Develop time management, organisation skills – key for all areas of career
- Make an informed choice about their future

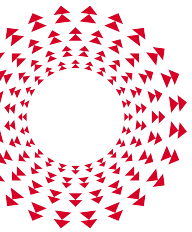

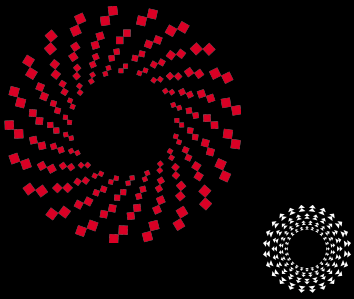

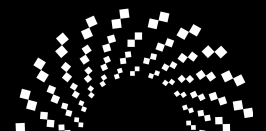

28 April 2026 UCAS search tool displays 2027 courses

12 May 2026 Undergraduate applications for 2027 Open

1 September 2026 Completed applications can be submitted

15 October 2026 Deadline for applications to Oxford & Cambridge, medicine, dentistry & veterinary medicine/science

13 January 2027 Equal consideration deadline

25 February 2027 UCAS Extra opens

Things to remember



- To start an application students need a **UCAS Hub account**.
- Register for UCAS Hub at any time.
- From **12th May 2026** able to '**Start**' application in UCAS Hub.
- You **can't** apply to **BOTH** Oxford and Cambridge.
- Applying **costs** £34.50 regardless of number of choices.
- **Follow school's internal deadline and apply before the equal consideration deadline**

Things to remember



- Students can make up to **five** choices (except Medicine / Vet Med which is **four**)
- Applications received by the key deadlines are given **equal consideration** – earlier applications may help in some cases
- ‘Invisibility’ – universities **cannot** see where else students have applied to
- Students can select a firm and an insurance place once all responses are received from universities.

Predicted Grades



Predicted grades are derived by academic department staff, overseen by the Head of Department in support of a student's progression to higher education, as well as progression to a range of other destinations, e.g. apprenticeship, employment.

UCAS says: "a predicted grade is the grade of qualification an applicant's school or college believes they're likely to achieve in positive circumstances."

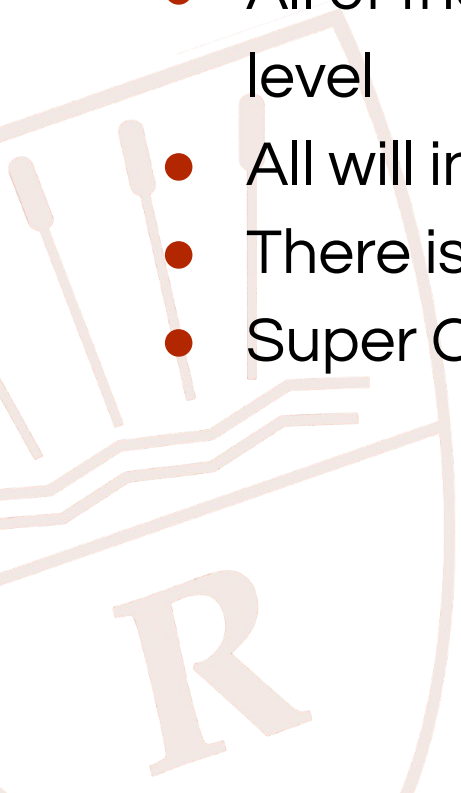
Predicted grades **should not be** affected by student, parental, guardian, or carer pressure – there are risks associated with inflating and suppressing predicted grades

Oxbridge / Early applicants



Oxbridge, Medicine, Dentistry and Vet Medicine

- All of these require the highest grades at GCSE and A level
- All will interview candidates
- There is huge competition for places
- Super Curricular v Extra Curricular



Oxbridge / Early applicants



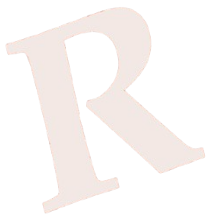
our programme :

- Meet to discuss applications, processes and deadlines
- Talk from ex students who are at (or graduated from) Oxford or Cambridge about life there
- Regular, informal meetings to discuss open day visits, plans and personal statements
- Talk from an ex student who was also a fellow at Cambridge about applications and interviews
- Ongoing support on personal application
- Open session with a range of ex students and current staff to discuss questions
- Mock interviews with feedback
- Participation with the Connolly Foundation "Raising Aspirations" programme

- Deadlines are all different
- Open dialogue early - please!



Clearing



Clearing is how unis and colleges fill any places they still have on their courses.

From July – October, you can apply for a course using Clearing if you're not already holding an offer from a university or college, and the course still has places.

You can use Clearing if:

- you're applying after the final application deadline
- you didn't receive any offers (or none you wanted to accept)
- you didn't meet the conditions of your offers
- you've declined your firm place

Clearing



In 2025 more than 77,000 students secured their place for university in Clearing (theuniguide.co.uk)

Students using it as choice rather than back up

General pattern is roughly in thirds:

- find a place after declining their original firm choice (Trade Ups)
- find a place after not meeting the terms of their offer
- either apply directly into Clearing or hold no firm choice.

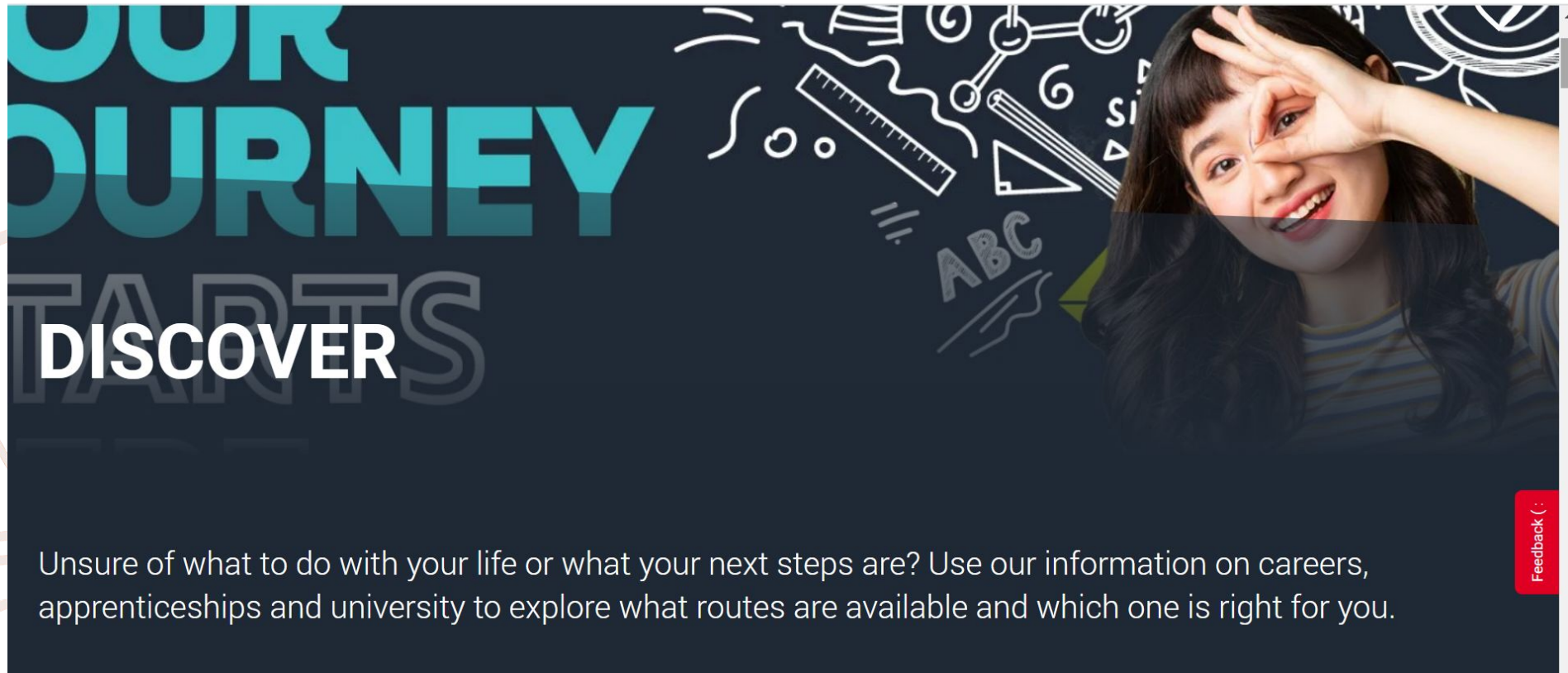

Students exploring their options through UCAS can now access subject tasters thanks to a relatively new collaboration with Springpod.

This allows students to explore, interact and sample university subjects and courses online before they apply.

By registering on the UCAS Hub, students will have access to interactive university course tasters which feature real-life lectures, seminars and academics, giving prospective students the opportunity to experience a variety of degree subjects that they may be considering studying.

Personal Statements



- Start early
- 4-5 drafts
- How do I make myself different from other applicants?
- What has sparked your interest / what have you done outside of school?
- Use your natural language / Use of AI
- Use your tutor

Outline any other supportive information specific to the applicant and relevant to the course(s) applied for that you think universities/colleges should be aware of.

- Fee code (02 UK, ChI, IoM student. Student Support: Bedfordshire)
- Not putting in A level subjects
- Incorrect exam boards and qualification - GCSE and A levels

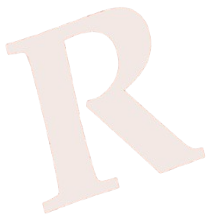

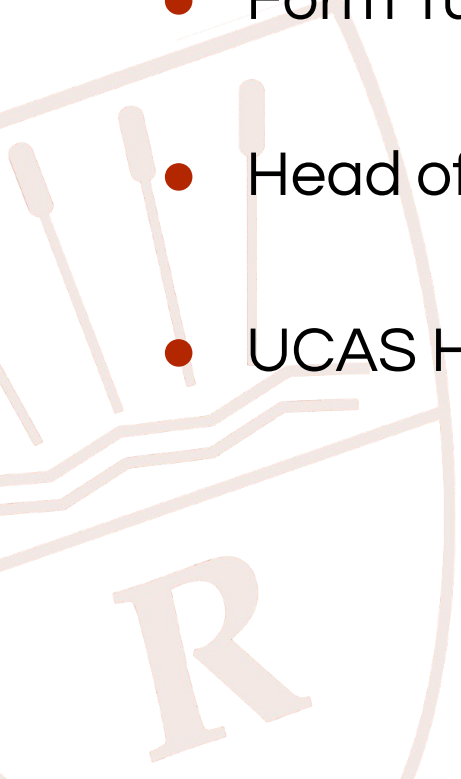
